

It has been an eventful start to the year for the Nairne Red Cross Branch and maybe you have come across us in your travels.

The year had barely started when two of our members were called upon to provide support to people affected by the Sampson Flat bushfires. I am sure their care and practical support was appreciated by those people they had contact with.

March was Red Cross Calling month and we were out and about in shopping centres in Mt Barker and Littlehampton. Thanks to the community's support, we raised \$1,343.20 for the organisation so it can continue the work in Australia and overseas.

Also in March, we attended the Mt Barker Show where we led the Grand Parade, proudly wearing vintage Red Cross uniforms to commemorate the ANZAC & Red Cross legacy. We also had an information booth from which we disseminated information about our numerous programs, including Emergency REDiPlan which aims to help households prepare for emergencies such as bushfires & floods.

In April, we are happy to assist the Nairne RSL branch on Anzac Day by serving tea and coffee at the Gunfire Breakfast after the Dawn Service, as we have for many years. This year sees a change of venue for us and the Nairne Lions, who provide a free breakfast of eggs and bacon, from the Nairne Institute to the Nairne Uniting Church Hall. We hope to see you there, in this the year that commemorates the Gallipoli Centenary.

Tony Semler, the President of the Nairne RSL, recently attended a Red Cross meeting to present a Certificate of Appreciation to the Nairne Red Cross for our assistance at the Gunfire Breakfast over many years. He also, most generously, presented us with a folder which is the result of thousands of hours of painstaking research. It is a pictorial record of WWII servicemen & women from our district and complements the information previously compiled about local WWI servicemen. ## Councillor's commentary...

**Hello again, and welcome to another (almost) new year!** We are already a third of the way into 2015, and Winter is nipping at our fingers and toes. I hope that this year is a good one for you. Following are some District Council of Mt Barker related activities in and around Nairne.

**Good news on the Bald Hills/SE Freeway interchange!** A recent joint statement by the Federal Assistant Minister for Infrastructure and Regional Development, Jamie Briggs, and SA Minister for Transport, Stephen Mullighan, indicates that the new freeway interchange will now be built with four ramps, two each to and from Adelaide and Murray Bridge. Previously the intention at this stage was to build only the ramps to and from Adelaide. However, after some very competitive tendering, the entire project will now be built at the originally estimated cost of \$27m (Federal Government \$16m, State Government \$8m and Council \$3m). The project will also include construction of a roundabout at the corner of Bald Hills Rd and the Old Princes Hwy. Work was expected to get under way in April 2015 and completed in 2016-17.

**Undergrounding of powerlines** in the central portion of Nairne's Main Street at a total cost of \$1.8m has now been completed, making way for the development of potential **street-scaping designs** for a reinvigorated business precinct. The project will also include an intended upgrade of Mick Murphy and Matthew Smillie Parks adjoining Main and Jeffrey Streets. There have already been several sets of consultations with Nairne traders and other interested community members, including a 'street walk' and community forum, both conducted on Wednesday 8 April. Council staff are now working with consultants to develop concepts and to bring these to the community for comment and input in the next few months. The brief for the consultants goes beyond developing a new set of aesthetics for the Main Street. We also need an ongoing process aimed at attracting and keeping new businesses to enhance the economic viability of the street. Money is expected in the 2015-16 Council budget to begin physical works coming out of the current design phase.

**Opportunity to re-zone Main Street properties.** One of the impediments to more active business has been the long-standing myriad zoning restrictions in the Main Street. Coming out of the approval of a Nairne Master Plan and Retail Study several years ago, the State planning minister recently approved a Statement of Intent by Council to lodge a 'Nairne & Environs Development Plan Amendment' (DPA) which would allow for greater flexibility when considering proposals for usage of existing properties along the Main Street. For example, it might be that a proponent would wish to use a property for both a business and an attached residence. The proposed DPA would provide an opportunity for such a development application to be considered.

**Reconstruction of South Terrace footpath between Burns Street and Market Place.** Included in the current 2014-15 Council budget, reconstruction of the footpath opposite the old railway station and between these two streets is now under way. Residents will recognise the area involved as that 'over the ridge' along this section of South Terrace (Old Princes Hwy). The new path will deliver much needed access for pedestrians wanting to get to the Main Street from Market Place.

**Two new bridges over Nairne Creek.** A new footbridge over the Nairne Creek at the intersection of Bridge Street, North Road and Sydney Road has recently been installed. A new rubble pathway and solar-powered lighting have been included in the project, which will provide better access to the shared path along Sydney Road to the Nairne Oval. Another footbridge destined for the creek crossing of the Jeffrey Street extension (behind 'Head, Heart and Hands') is currently being constructed off-site. That bridge is expected to be installed by June 2015.

**Nairne Sports Complex upgrade continues apace.** Work is well under way for the construction of a second oval at the Nairne Sports Complex on Sydney Road, together with additional tennis/netball courts, lighting, access roads and car-parking. Most of the funding (\$200,000) for this project has been donated by the **Nairne Market** to the Nairne Oval Committee, with an additional two grants of \$50,000 each by Council and the State Office of Recreation and Sport.

**New Budget items.** Council and staff are still working up the 2015-16 draft budget in a series of internal workshops. The first full draft of the Annual Business Plan (incorporating the budget) is expected to be presented at a Council meeting scheduled for Monday 20 April. The draft will then be available for community submissions and general input until 9 June, followed by a special public meeting on Monday 15 June. The final document will be presented to Council for its approval on Monday 6 July. While still very much subject to further consideration, among others, the following Nairne-related items have been proposed for inclusion in the budget, either as projects proposed by me or various Council officers:

Little Dublin East shared trail connecting Bald Hills Road to Jeffrey Street

Main Street street-scaping

North Road surface upgrade and Bridge Street/Sydney Road/North Road intersection upgrade

Construction of new footpath on Woodside Road between Stirling and Pulleine Roads

Upgrade/replacement of Mick Murphy Park public toilets

Upgrade of Nairne Soldiers Memorial Hall (as Council asset).

One of the challenges facing the Mt Barker District Council in its budget deliberations this year will be the loss of Federal and State funds for local government **general rates concessions** for eligible citizens. Federal funding for these was cut in 2014, and by the State government in 2015. In the absence of concessions, some in the community could be expected to pay an extra \$190 pa. Council has joined with the Local Government Association and most other SA Councils seeking reconsideration of the cuts. Petitions are available at the Council office and Mt Barker Library for you to add your signature. They are also available at many retail outlets in the District.

**Nairne Soldiers Memorial Hall as community centre.** At the time of writing, we seem to be close to Council assuming responsibility for the Nairne Soldiers Memorial Hall (NSMH) as an enhanced community centre. For some time, it has been recognised that, with a growing population, Nairne needs a more adequate community centre. The NSMH Committee has proposed to Council that its facility be passed over to Council for that purpose. Following detailed discussions between the Committee and Council over the last twelve months, together with a range of building integrity checks, it was expected that a proposal would soon be put to Council for approval for it to assume responsibility for the building and to start to work towards its redevelopment.

**Council Community Grants approved.** Forty-eight applications for community grants in a second round of applications in 2014-15 were considered by the Community Grants Assessment Committee in March. Twenty-three applications, amounting to around \$35,000, were recommended for approval by Council at its 20 April meeting. Included in the successful applications were:

Nairne Bremer United Football Club – ‘Leaders for Life’ youth program

Nairne Institute Committee—equipment for new museum

Nairne Oval Committee—construction of disabled ramp to clubrooms

Nairne RSL memorial Anzac centenary project.

A further two applications for grants from other Nairne community groups were unsuccessful on this occasion - Nairne & Districts Lions Club (new flagpole) and Nairne & District Residents Association (heritage trail plaques). The next round of grant applications will be invited in August-September 2015.

**Nairne Museum opening.** Over the last several years, the Nairne Institute Committee has been working hard to create a museum at the Institute building. The official opening, to be undertaken by Mayor Ann Ferguson at **10 am on Saturday 9 May**, will feature a gunfire salute by the Adelaide Regiment (c.1880s) re-enactment group, displays of historic costumes, archaeological artefacts, photos, documents and many other items relating to Nairne’s 175 years of European history. Included in the display of costumes will be replicas of costumes worn by Nairne’s own local military regiment which existed in the early 1860s. Refreshments will be provided by the Nairne Red Cross. **Please put this occasion in your diary!**

## AND IT HAPPENED IN NAIRNE

In writing this, my fourth and final article for Nairne News, I'm going to focus on the interaction between folks in my old hometown of Callington and those who lived in Nairne in the good old days of yore. To set scene for another story in which Nairne café proprietor Tommy Thomas plays a part, I'm going to tell of some of the antics of a male whippet dog that was notorious for getting into strife in Callington in the 1960's. This canine villain was owned by a Callington resident whom we'll call 'Wally'. Wally lived with his wife in the middle of the little village, and the miscreant dog's adventures included acts of unlawful entry, sexual impropriety and theft. One of his indiscretions in the sexual realm began when he picked up the scent of a little female hound that had been locked up overnight in her owners old Ford sedan in the towns main street to keep her from roaming would-be suitors. She was in season and she was locked in the car to protect and maintain her purity. However, her owner had left the car boot unlocked and open, and so all that lay between the roaming whippet and the amorous quarry inside was the back seat-rest of the car, which was made of horse hair, leather, and rows of large spiral steel springs. And so the lusty villain leapt into the boot and went to work on the seat-rest; springs and horse hair were scattered far and wide when the car's owner found the two canines locked in passionate embrace in his vehicle early the following morning. His rage was indescribable, and the whippet was lucky to escape with his life! Word of the incident spread quickly around the little town, and one character who heard of the episode, made a wry comment "Oh well, I s'pose love will always find a way!"

On another occasion, the whippet's owner found the dog burying a half eaten chicken in the back yard of his home. Wally was perplexed and puzzled as to the origin of the cooked chicken. A day or two later Wally was walking along the street, and he heard the local publican's wife having an animated discussion with another town resident. As he passed he heard the publican's wife say,

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“You know, you can’t trust anyone in town these days... I cooked a chicken the other evening, and took it out of the oven and I put it out on the tank stand to cool...and do yer know what? ...when I went out half an hour later it was gone! Someone had pinched it!...How about that,eh?”

Wally just kept walking, and he said nothing! The mystery of the backyard burial had been solved!

And now, with a little insight as to the character and the habits of ‘Wally’s Whippet’, let’s bring Nairne into the picture. And the picture unfolds like this: Tommy Thomas, whom I told you about in an earlier story, had driven to Callington with a pile of sausages that had been ordered by his friend, the local hotel keeper. Tommy was possibly driving a Holden ute, and the pile of sausages were in a package beside him on the seat of the vehicle. On arrival at the pub, Tommy parked the ute outside and went in to greet his friends and to tell him that the snags were all out there on the seat of the ute as per the earlier request. After exchanging a few comments and maybe downing and ale or two, Tommy headed off out to his ute to bring in the snags. However, there had been one huge oversight on Tommy’s part: he’d left the window open on a door of the vehicle, and he walked out to see Wally’s Whippet scrambling out through the open window with a string of sausages trailing out and over the door and onto the ground below. The string of snags grew ever longer as the dog made a dash towards his home, which lay a few hundred metres away. Tommy gave chase, but how many snags he retrieved and how many the whippet dragged home to his burial plot, was not revealed to me by Wally, the dog’s owner, and it’s still unknown today.

As I’ve said before— truth will always be stranger than fiction, and a darn sight more interesting. And it all happened! It’s true!

And now to some more serious relationships between the people of Nairne and Callington: First, the medicos. The doctors. From my first years at Callington Primary School in the early 1940’s, I remember a kindly little doctor coming from Nairne to Callington to give us kids injections at the local hotel, situated only a couple of hundred metres from the school. His name was Doctor Rosenbaum. I believe that in later years he went on to specialise in a particular realm of medicine under the name of Doctor Ross. In the mid-fifties, Doctor James Richards came down from Nairne to treat the people of Callington. This included a period when an epidemic of Yellow Jaundice (now hepatitis) went through the little village—probably due to the poor sanitary conditions that prevailed in those days with everyone having those little backyard ‘dunnies’. I fell victim to the disease at Christmas time, and I well remember the feelings of nausea and loss of appetite and zest, and also the treatment rendered by Doctor Richards. He lived on a hill across the road from the Nairne Railway Station. Perhaps that was the residence of all doctors who practiced in Nairne?

Doctor Richards had an intense dislike for a particular pain killer that many people took in those days—including my parents. And he always sternly warned then that their use of this medication didn’t appear to do them a lot of harm. I believe that Doctor Richards went on to practice at Meningie after leaving Nairne, and that his life ended at that location.

Police sergeants from Nairne also came down to maintain or restore order in my little hometown. My earliest memory in that realm was of Sergeant Alf Laslett. His old square ‘boxie’ sedan would putter –putter past Callington school with little puffs of smoke coming from the gas-producer that was mounted on the rear of the vehicle to provide power during the petrol-rationing days of World War Two. On Murray Bridge Race Days in the 1950’s, Sergeant Eric Weich would leap across the railway tracks and up onto the platform at Callington Railway Station to say G’day to



The aim is to engage with children, deliver age appropriate road safety knowledge and develop safety focused attitudes.

## **More Green Army projects on the ground in the Mayo electorate**

The Australian Government's Green Army program is gaining momentum across the Adelaide Hills, Fleurieu Peninsula and Kangaroo Island, with another three projects on the ground in the Alexandrina, Yankalilla and Kangaroo Island council districts.

The Green Army program provides opportunities for young Australians aged 17-24 years to gain training and experience in environmental and heritage conservation fields and explore careers in conservation management, while participating in projects that generate real benefits for the environment.

Through the program, teams of ten (up to nine participants and one team supervisor) are deployed to projects lasting 20-26 weeks across Australia to help communities deliver local conservation outcomes.

These participants will not only be generating real environment and conservation benefits for our community, but they will be gaining valuable practical training and experience to help them prepare for the workforce or further training and improve their career opportunities.

The projects that will be delivered over the next six months include:

- **Implementing the Southern Fleurieu Coastal Action Plan**

Project Sponsor: District Council of Yankalilla

Service Provider: Workskil

This Green Army project will address conservation priorities across the Fleurieu Peninsula. Participants will help conserve the natural coastal heritage, monitor the vulnerable Hooded Plover, continue revegetation programs to improve habitat for butterflies and to control problem weeds. The focus will be on the two highest priority areas, the Normanville Heritage listed sand dunes and the Cape Jervis Coastal Reserves.

- **Enhancing Kangaroo Island ecosystems from coast to coast – Project 1**

Project Sponsor: Kangaroo Island Natural Resources Management Board

Service Provider: Workskil

This project involves improving the condition and extent of native vegetation and protecting nationally threatened and regionally significant species across Kangaroo Island. Teams will gain skills in seed collection, propagation and revegetation while restoring a threatened ecological community. Participants will learn a range of techniques in weed control and will maintain walking and fire trails to reduce erosion to protect remnant vegetation and conservation areas. Participants will also survey koalas and shorebirds, removing coastal debris and reducing the impact of feral cats in little penguin colonies.

- **Enhancing Urban Biodiversity at Goolwa and Strathalbyn**

Project Sponsor: Alexandrina Council

Service Provider: Workskil

This project will be delivered across the Alexandrina Council area with a focus on urban biodiversity assets within the townships of Goolwa and Strathalbyn. The Green Army will undertake restoration works at selected project sites to improve the extent and condition of two local biodiversity corridors, the Goolwa Beach Urban Biodiversity Network, and the Strathalbyn Angas River Corridor, including the Middle Creek, Dawson Creek and Burnside Creek tributaries. Work undertaken by the Green Army team will complement the work of two well-established community groups, Goolwa Coastcare and the Angas River Catchment Group, and the Trees for Life 'Bush for Life' program.

The Green Army is a key Government commitment with \$525 million budgeted over four years.

The program will encourage practical, grassroots action to support local environment and heritage conservation projects across Australia, providing training to 15,000 young Australians by 2018.

This investment in the Green Army will bring the Government's total investment in natural resource management to more than \$2 billion over four years.

## Remembering our local heroes

A word from the Anglican church in Blakiston

**O**n 28 April 1847, the church of St. James at Blakiston was opened with the Rev. J Pollitt as the priest, and little did those parishioners know that their families would be affected by World War.

There were several priests who were incumbent on this area until, in 1874, Rev. John Gower became Rector of this Parish and he served in that capacity until 1900. After this he remained in the area living at his residence 'Wynyard'. When he retired from active ministry, owing to his advancing years, he was made Rural Dean. He died at Wynyard on 21 April 1915.

Little did he know that his son John Lewis Davison Gower, who was a member of the Australian Forces, would be killed just four days later. He landed on the Gallipoli Peninsula with the Battalion Scouts and at about 9 am formed part of the screen that went to cover the company while they entrenched. He failed to return.

There were other men from this area who had connections with St James and whom we remember at this time when we celebrate the 100 year anniversary of the landing at Gallipoli.



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Mark Gray Jnr, son of Mark and Janet Gray of Littlehampton, was killed in action on 28 Oct 1916 and is commemorated on the Villers-Bretonneux memorial in France. A younger brother, Frederick Gray died of bronco-pneumonia in the hospital at Rouen in France on 8 March 1917.

Their mother, Janet Gray died in 1941 and is interred in the St James cemetery.

We are unable to discover a connection to Benjamin Gray, the founder of Littlehampton, but if there is anyone with that knowledge I would be pleased to hear it.

We continue to worship at **St James on the second and fourth Sundays in each month at 8.30 am**, and we also have a fellowship group which meets on the first Thursday in the month. Please feel free to join us.

We remember the ANZACs and the hard fought for peace, which the world sadly still needs today.

my old boss – Station Master, Angy Watts. Sergeant Weich was in uniform, and he was obviously on his way to be on duty at the Murray Bridge Races. Sergeant Bradtke was another officer to serve in Nairne and whose duties incorporated events and problems occurring at Callington.

Another interaction between residents from the two towns greatly benefitted the woman-folk of Callington. This occurred on certain weekdays in the 1940's when a Miss Bayfield came down from Nairne to Callington on the morning train to teach sewing lessons in a room at the rear of the town's Methodist Church. She would arrive at Callington at 9.20 am, and she would then walk down from the station to the church to begin lessons. Miss Bayfield returned to Nairne on the train from Mt. Gambier that left Callington at 6.00 pm in the evenings. My mother was one of the many Callington ladies whose sewing skills were enhanced by personal instruction from Miss Bayfield of Nairne.

There is also much evidence to suggest that long-time Nairne café proprietor, Mick Murphy, had a lot to do with my old hometown in earlier days. I remember Mick well as a cricket umpire when I played in the Eastern Hills Association in the early 1950's, and he provided me with the best photos that I have of huge floods in the Bremer River that ran past the front of our family home at Callington when I was a lad. I recall with pleasure the memory of the chats that I had with Mick in the twilight years of life on this planet.

And so there we are: That's it! I've penned those stories in response to a request made to me early in 2014. In so doing I have shared some of the countless experiences that have been mine in my almost 79 years of life that I have enjoyed in the southern region of this wonderful wide, brown land of ours, Australia. And I have put pen to paper with just one thought in mind, and with one single, solitary hope—that someone, somewhere will derive pleasure and pleasant memories from reading what I have written. I couldn't ask for more! Cheers for now! Ray Jaensch.

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
