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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President's AGM Report



Mark Clemow, Past President, Nairne & District Residents' Association

The following report was tabled at the Annual General Meeting of the Nairne & District Residents' Association Incorporated on Wednesday August 15th 2018. It is reproduced here in full.

It was a honour to have been re-elected President of the

Nairne & District Residents' Association (NDRA) at the start of this year and to have had the opportunity to continue our great work.

During the year I received feedback from various third parties in state government and local government leadership that the NDRA was one of the most effective and well conducted residents' associations in the state. This is a great compliment to our agenda, the way in which we interact with our stakeholders and to the members who make things happen. Like all volunteer community organisations, we have struggled to get the numbers we need to fully realise our opportunities, but we have certainly punched above our weight with what we could do. I would therefore like to open this report by thanking the people who worked with us, attended our events and engaged with our agenda.

Nairne is a terrific community, with lots of potential ahead of us. We need a strong, unified and realistic agenda driven by an NDRA which is respected and supported across the community and stakeholders. Without this, our cultural, social and economic progress will be uncoordinated and the people of Nairne will miss the benefit of a community-wide commitment to common goals.

The past year saw the start of many long awaiting projects and improvements for Nairne.

Main Street redevelopment

The first stages of the Main Street redevelopment started in March and were completed several months later. This saw the replacement of trees and the improvement of footpaths and drainage along the northern side. The beautification of

this section will evolve with plantings and street furniture to be installed. Subsequent stages of redevelopment will occur over the next three years, involving other sections of the Main Street and culminating in the establishment of a Village Green in the area bordered by the Main Street, Jeffrey Street and Allargue Street.

The NDRA has been deeply involved in this redevelopment, running information sessions for the community and communicating updates via our meetings and various channels.

NDRA meetings have been varied and interesting

Our monthly meetings have seen a steady attendance. The bi-monthly Councillors' forum has proven a popular opportunity for community members to learn about the work of Council and to ask specific questions about Nairne. We are fortunate to have four North Ward Councillors who take these forums seriously with their attendance and preparation.

We have also focused on interesting and relevant topics and guest speakers, including the Premium Beverages complex (on Chambers Road), the Millers Arms Hotel, the Member for Kavel and the Nairne RSL.

Community forums

The NDRA has a role in connecting the community with information about stakeholders and government.

In March, prior to the state election, we conducted a community forum for people to meet and hear presentations from the seven candidates contesting the seat of Kavel. We had about 80 people attend that forum. At the first meeting of the NDRA immediately following the election, the newly elected Member was our guest speaker.

In July, prior to the Mayo by election, we conducted a similar community forum with four of the seven candidates. We had about 130 people attend and it was broadcast live on Hills Radio. The forum and role of the NDRA was reported in national news for a period afterwards.

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With the forthcoming local government elections, the NDRA will be conducting a forum with candidates for the North Ward of Mount Barker District Council.

Nairne News does our community proud

Nairne News continues to serve an essential role in providing information and resources to the community, especially to the large number of people who do not interact with social media. The Nairne News editorial team have refined the many improvements to the quality and presentation that they introduced last year.

I am very proud of how Nairne News represents the NDRA and the brand of Nairne. I would like to thank and acknowledge Kerri Oakley, Ruth Morris, Ariel Elliott-Potter, Tianna Easther, Margaret Vincent, Meredith Laube and Barry Laube for their work in publishing and distributing Nairne News. I would also like to thank the businesses of Nairne for giving prominent space in their premises to sell the publication and for supporting the community with their advertising.

NDRA Facebook provides safe and accurate information

Our NDRA Facebook page surpassed 1,000 followers in July, an increase from 675 a year ago and from 150 in the year prior.

There has been a serious commitment to providing regular posts of accurate and relevant information consistent with our agenda. The engagement with the page and the feedback has indicated the community want and appreciate information in social media without negativity and clutter. They also appreciate receiving accurate and informed responses to their questions and comments.

There were plans to improve the Nairne website, but we lacked the resources to do it. We have kept it up to date, however an overhaul of the presentation is a priority for the coming year.

Tourism focus

This year we established a working group to look at how we support and promote tourism in Nairne and district. I would like to thank the members of this small group, which is led by our Vice President Leif Brown. Tourism promotion is a key focus for Nairne, especially with integrating the various

developments ahead of us, with our history and culture. The role of this group is to develop and implement a tourism plan and vision for Nairne that will establish our identity as a tourism destination. The key to making this work is to get engagement from all stakeholders and a greater number of people willing to be a part of the group.

In April we were excited to be named by The Weekend Australian as South Australia's best regional community. This created a lot of discussion in local and national media and stimulated interest in the town as a tourism destination and a place of significant economic and social opportunity.

Three great events supported by the NDRA and enjoyed by the community

The NDRA sponsored three events during the year.

The Nairne Carols by the Lake on Saturday December 9th 2017 was enjoyed by about 400 people on the lawns of Byethorne Park. This year we focused on a traditional Christmas concert, with local artists and the feedback was very positive. I would like to acknowledge the work of the volunteers of the organising committee, but in particular the leader Ellen Lyall, who threw herself into the event with energy and passion. I would also like to thank the Nairne Market, the District Council of Mount Barker and Thomas Foods International for their generous financial support for what is an increasingly expensive event to stage.

We have been told by many people that the Nairne Carols by the Lake is the best organised and most enjoyable community carols event in the Adelaide Hills. It is a great honour for the NDRA to bring happiness and unity to the community at Christmas.

In April we participated in the South Australian History Festival by opening the historic buildings of our Main Street to visitors and running guided walking tours. This event was successful beyond our expectations, proving the growing interest in the historic significance and beauty of the town. There is no question this will become an annual event and we also believe there is value in offering regular walking tours throughout the warmer months. I would like to thank Annette Gladigau and the large volunteer group of local historians who organised the event, staffed the museum, created displays and led the walking tours. It was brilliant to see so many volunteer people and organisations working together

and the Main Street full of people walking and enjoying our history.

In July we ran our annual Family Film Night in the Soldiers Memorial Hall. The weather was very poor, which detracted a few people from coming out of their homes, but we still managed a good crowd of around 80, who enjoyed the socialising and the show. I would like to thank Annette Gladigau, who brings this event together almost single-handedly every year, as well as the District Council of Mount Barker who fund the night.

Major commercial improvements for Nairne

The past year saw the commencement of three major commercial development projects for Nairne that will stimulate our economy, improve local services and provide jobs.

After a long wait, the redevelopment of the Old Chapmans factory into a supermarket was approved in June and demolition began in July. We are told by the developers that the shopping centre, which has five smaller stores in addition to the supermarket, will be open for Christmas shopping in 2019. This development is perhaps the biggest thing to happen in Nairne (economically) since the Chapmans factory opened in 1899. The NDRA believes that this development will stimulate a revival of the Main Street. With a raised profile and more traffic passes through, viable opportunities for service, recreational and food businesses will increase.

The redevelopment of the Millers Arms Hotel will add further stimulus to the Main Street when it opens prior to December this year and the premium beverages complex on Chambers Road will make Nairne tourism and visitor destination. When coupled with the various redevelopments in the Main Street, this is another positive thing for the town.

New community projects for Nairne

The NDRA is currently sponsoring two community improvement projects for Nairne. The first, which has been underway for some time, is using a small grant from the Mount Barker District Council to add some interest to the Main Street. We put the project on hold pending the redevelopment of the Main Street and recommenced it in July, with a survey among traders and residents to gauge support for two ideas. At the time of writing this report, we are preparing a further proposal for Council that we hope will be realised in the Spring and Summer.

Our next major project is to work with Council on the establishment of a Village Green, bordered by the Main Street, Jeffrey Street and Allargue Street. Exactly how this space looks will be determined by community consultation, but it could incorporate gardens, playgrounds, performance spaces, art, toilets, recreation and barbecues. The plan is to establish it by the end of 2021, subject to the availability of funds from local and state sources. The NDRA sees this as an exciting culmination of the overall redevelopment of the Main Street precinct and we look forward to engaging the whole community in building how it will look.

The NDRA is a collective of passionate volunteers who care about Nairne

Much of the work of the NDRA happens in the background. We receive a constant stream of queries and information via telephone, post, email and Facebook that are efficiently dealt with. In some ways, being a co-ordinator and facilitator between residents and stakeholders, is one of the most important functions of the NDRA. The engine room of the NDRA is our Secretary Annette Gladigau. Annette is a skilled Secretary, but what makes her work so valuable is her passion for Nairne and the work of the NDRA. I cannot overstate what a pillar of support and hard work Annette has been. I would also like to acknowledge and thank Kerri Oakley who held the role of Treasurer. Astute and efficient financial management is very important to a community organisation and Kerri never failed to give good advice, report accurately and ensure that all our financial obligations were met. In addition to this role, she led the Nairne News team.

Many people with the NDRA membership have stepped up to take on various tasks and to support our efforts throughout the year. I have only specifically mentioned the Secretary and Treasurer because of their key roles, but everyone who has contributed has been appreciated. Volunteering to make a difference to people, is the foundation of a great community and I thank every person who has volunteered for the NDRA and has taken on various large and small tasks.

In December I took leave from the role of President through to the February meeting. I would like to thank Vice President Leif Brown and the NDRA Executive for supporting me and effectively operating the association during this time.

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Looking forward to the next year

Nairne is no different to any community, where the pool of available volunteers is small, but the agenda is large. We value every person and group who can help us achieve our goal of furthering the social, cultural and economic prosperity of Nairne, no matter how big or small their contribution.

Volunteers are at the heart of a good community, so it saddens me when volunteers are criticised or undermined for their honest efforts to make a difference. We hear reports all the time of dwindling volunteer numbers in all kinds of organisations and it seems one of the reasons is the politics that stymie their passion.

Unfortunately the rise of social media has stimulated a culture of negativity in communities, where people are more inclined to criticise and make suggestions about how things should be done differently, than they are to step up and make a real difference. In recent months we have seen some terrible examples of the potential of social media to be vicious and hurtful, so we must not let that happen in Nairne.

We should not forget that at the heart of every community activity are volunteers giving and doing the best they can.

Our biggest challenge in the coming year remains unity, both within the community and the NDRA. The whole community must work together to understand, support and complement the goals of the various organisations that give us the lifestyle, culture and facilities that we value.

There are many great organisations doing terrific work with their own agendas, but if we are to make Nairne a successful community, all agendas need to be aligned and all people united. This need for unity starts with the membership of the NDRA. Working together with respect, collaboration and humility will make our town great.

The broad objectives of the NDRA mean that we have a responsibility as the bastion of unity and leadership for Nairne, so how we conduct and present our association is an important example to others.

I would like to congratulate and wish well the leadership and office holders of the NDRA in the coming year and thank the members and the community for working with me to make this past year a successful one. I will not be seeking reelection as President for 2018/19.

Due to a change in family circumstances I will not be running in the next Council Election, but plan to remain active in the community, working on a couple of projects in the pipeline.

I would like to congratulate those nominating candidates for stepping forward into the firing line. Although elected members receive an allowance, that does not cover the amount of time and effort put into the role, and I hope that whoever is successful gets the full support from the community, that this primarily volunteer role deserves.

Over the past three years I have worked collaboratively with fellow Councillors, council staff, NDRA and residents to achieve some fantastic outcomes for Nairne, including the following.

Nairne DPA

The rezoning of the DPA not only retained and protected the green buffer in Nairne West and the mixed used along the railway line, but also enabled the application to be submitted to redevelop Chapmans.

Nairne Market/Police Cells Restoration Project

After discovering the works had been removed from the draft budget, I worked with the Nairne Market and Greg Parker, General Manager at Council to ensure it received the funding required for the restoration. This was vital for the Nairne Market's future and the health and safety of the volunteers.

Pedestrian and cycle linkage from Byethorne Park to Main Road

Since January 2016 I have been advocating for a pedestrian and cycle linkage from Byethorne Park to Nairne Main Street. I am pleased that funds have been allocated in this year's budget for that purpose. This was helped by the Main Street upgrade as well as Katrina Windebank and Lynette Sharps successful Fund My Neighbourhood Grants.

- Nixon Street Ford rebuild
- Nairne Memorial Hall upgrades
- Nairne Cenotaph Screen (to be installed this year)

Other matters such as improvements and upgrades to our roads, sporting facilities and residents concerns and queries.

I have also had the privilege on being on the Grants Committee which provides funds to many groups throughout our district, and recently the Cat Management Working Group.

Looking towards the future I have advised Council the priorities I feel we need are:

- Effective communication between Council, Councillors and residents on all matters.
- Youth facility/arts hub - to provide a youth space similar to the model of 'The Station' at Murray Bridge, which incorporates youth centre, Headspace, The Band Connection.
- The transition of the Nairne Memorial Hall into a more utilised space, such as a Community Centre.
- Linking the surrounding townships to Mount Barker via a cycle and pedestrian track.

A special thanks to the Nairne and Districts Residents Association, especially the President Mark Clemow and Secretary Annette Gladigau. Their dedication to the community and their support to me has been unconditional.

Nairne is continuing to grow with both residential and commercial development. A positive and supportive community that works together will thrive.

ST. JAMES BLAKISTON NEWSLETTER

July 25th is the Patronal Festival of St James Church, that is the day we celebrate our patron St James.

He is known as the Patron of Pilgrims and Labourers and was named by Jesus as one of the Sons of Thunder. St John was his brother and they were the sons of Zebedee. They were followers of John the Baptist and then Jesus of Nazareth and they worked as fishermen. James the Greater was chosen by Jesus to be one of the twelve apostles and to spread the gospel.

He made a pilgrimage to Spain to spread the gospel of Jesus. He then returned to Judea, where he was beheaded by King Herod Agrippa in the Year 44. He is said to be buried in Santiago de Compostela in Spain, which explains why he is the Patron Saint of Spain.

Today there are many pilgrims who take one of the various walks along the Camino de Santiago.

The question still remains for us: why was St James chosen as our Patron Saint? Our early settlers were certainly pilgrims and labourers.

However, they were faithful people and despite many difficulties had built a Rectory, the house alongside the church which was the Rector's residence, the church which was dedicated in 1847 and established a cemetery in the church grounds.

The wardens, curator and congregation of this church are deeply appreciative of their dedication and we have people who have commented on the neatness of the area.

It assists those who are constantly aware of the need to maintain our church for future generations.

VOLUNTEERING

• Kitchen Helpers

Kitchen helpers assist with meal preparation, tidying and even washing up! Usually between 9:30am and 11.30 am each weekday.

• Drivers

Drivers use their own cars to deliver meals to clients between 11.15 am to 1.30 pm each weekday. The distance involved is generally less than 15km and a driver reimbursement is available. Between 15 and 25 meals are delivered in each delivery round. Drivers need to have evidence of their own comprehensive insurance.

• Deliverers

For safety and security reasons, both the deliverer and the driver deliver the meal to the client. So each driver works with a deliverer, to deliver meals into the homes of clients between 11.15am and 1.30pm.

• Emergency Drivers and Deliverers

Time an issue? You can also volunteer as an emergency driver or deliverer. Rather than being on a regular roster, you'll simply be called on to fill in when a kitchen helper or regular driver or deliverer can't make it.

• Branch Administrative Roles

Flee the Flea

If you're like most of us here (except Mel because she loves the cold and is weird like that) you will be looking forward to Spring and the warmer weather. Unfortunately, as the weather improves we start to see those nasty little fleas pop up more and more. If your curious why, this is because flea larva development prefers temperatures above 18 degrees. The flea we typically see is called *Ctenocephalides felis*, but don't let the name trick you, it is found both on the cat and dog. Given their rate of reproduction, flea burdens can grow incredibly rapidly with a single female laying up to 50 eggs each day. This is the reason flea infestations can quickly go from bad to worse. What follows is some information about fleas, how you can identify them and what you can do about them.

Fleas infest the host by jumping onto them from the environment. Contrary to what most people think they don't tend to leave one host from another, meaning flea free animals don't typically get them from contacting infested animals but rather from infested environments. They cause irritation to the skin by biting and consuming a blood meal. Normally the worse the infestation the worse the skin irritation, but in patients who have a flea bite allergy they can develop severe reactions to minimal burdens. Additionally, most people aren't aware that fleas are the intermediate host for tapeworm and serve as a carrier for infectious organisms such as mycoplasma. These are just added reasons why flea prevention is an important consideration.

So how do you tell if your cat or dog has fleas?

Well it's not always easy to see them, especially when in low numbers. They move away from light quickly and can be hard to find. If you can't find adult fleas then look for 'flea dirt'. Flea dirt is flea poo and is deep brown 1-2mm long and normally sitting on the skin. When soaked in wet paper towel or cotton wool the flea poo leaves a red streak confirming blood presence and ensures it's not just actual dirt.

Some dogs and cats don't show many signs, especially when they have low numbers. Others will scratch or bite nonstop and can have red irritated skin with raised red bumps called papules. Although lesions are typically on the back half of the body, they can actually be anywhere. Severe burdens can even cause lethargy and blood loss anaemia causing pale mucous membranes. This is a very serious issue in small puppies and kittens and makes them severely ill.

The good news is that fleas can be treated and prevented.

However, because the environment is a major factor for flea infestations the environment also needs to be treated. Washing your pets bedding thoroughly, vacuuming and regular garden maintenance if they are outdoors – such as removing leaves and brush and regular mowing of the lawn can also help. We find that flea collars and powders are not an effective treatment and either oral or topical applications specifically treating fleas are the best. Topicals are a great option when you can't give your pet oral medications. You ideally want to kill the adult fleas with an adulticide but also prevent reproduction with an insect growth regulator, so you break the cycle. Most of the products available treat for a month and are very effective and safe. Those pets that have severe reactions may need additional treatment during the initial management phase.

If you need some help or are unsure about which product best suits you then please come and have a chat to the team. I hope everyone can enjoy a flea free happy summer.

Free Breast Cancer Screening in Mount Barker

BreastScreen SA's mobile screening unit is visiting Mount Barker to provide free breast cancer screening (breast X-rays) for more than 3,100 local women.

Screening appointments will commence in late July and will continue until mid-December 2018, with the mobile screening unit located in the car park at Summit Health Care, 85 Wellington Road, Mount Barker.

BreastScreen SA Promotions and Education Manager, Karen Woodcock, said the two biggest risk factors for breast cancer are being a woman and being over 50. "Further, nine out of 10 women who get breast cancer have no family history of this disease," Ms Woodcock said.

"While breast cancer cannot be prevented, the best way to detect it early is by having a screening mammogram every two years. Screening mammograms can detect most breast cancers, including some too small to be felt."

The earlier a breast cancer is found, the more chance a woman has of successful treatment.

"At BreastScreen SA, each woman's X-rays are read by two, independent radiologists and the results are posted within 14 days," Ms Woodcock said.

"Most women are then reassured that their mammogram shows no evidence of breast cancer."

"One breast screen is not enough to last a lifetime. It takes just 10 minutes, and it could save your life," said Ms Woodcock.

"If you're a woman aged 50 to 74, have a breast screen every two years on the mobile screening unit while it's visiting Mount Barker."

From compiling old photos and finding an old school sports trophy, a chance discovery at the Nairne museum referenced a time capsule being placed in the school roof at the end of the Centenary celebrations in 1976. After asking many people whether they knew anything about the time capsule a call was sent out during the History Weekend. Some did have a vague memory of it, what proved even more elusive was whether the time capsule had even been found and reopened.

Having confirmed there was a time capsule it turns out there was a second one buried in 2000. According to an article in the Courier the 1976 time capsule was a "decorated tin" and "contained a selection of students' work from that era".

Governing Council minutes state that it wasn't found in the roof, rather in a storage room.

The new mystery is where is the new time capsule that was buried in 2000? Some staff from that time remain at the school and have varying recollections about where it might be buried, as there is no plaque referencing where it is located. Governing Council minutes do not give any clues and there is no articles about it in the Courier. Former students who came to see the display of school memorabilia at the Soldiers Memorial Hall during the history weekend also gave varying locations around the school. Do you know where it is located? It is due to be opened in 2025.

I have also recently successfully advocated for the installation of new and additional school zone signage in Market Place. I would like to take the opportunity to thank Council for installing this in July. Please take care in and around school zones.

In many other parts of Australia they have not been so lucky and are really suffering from the consequences of severe drought. Every passing week without deep, watering rains becomes another week of despair.


